

Consider the following HTML document:

```
!DOCTYPE html>
<html>
  <head>
    <meta charset="UTF-8">
    <title>SE2840 CSS Practice</title>
  </head>
  <body>
    <!--font is Arial, 24px. Page background is black. -->
    <p>This is brown</p>
    <h1>This is blue;<em>this is green</em></h1>
    <h1 class="a">This is cyan;<em>this is grey</em></h1>
    <p class="a">This is red</p>
    <p id="b">This is orange;<em>this is yellow</em></p>
    <p>This is white </p>
  </body>
</html>
```

Without modifying any of the html markup within the <body>...</body> tags, add the CSS styling rules so that the resulting output looks like the page that follows.

Note that you could insert the CSS rules either directly into the html document or in a separate CSS document, but you should know how to do both.

Hint for the brown and white paragraphs: This can be done multiple ways. It was not discussed in lecture and the solution is not contained in the slide set. Search for a solution via the CSS selectors reference at [http://www.w3schools.com/cssref/css\\_selectors.asp](http://www.w3schools.com/cssref/css_selectors.asp).

Often, a simple CSS error will entirely prevent the style rules from working. Check your implementation for validity with both the HTML and CSS validators.
